## From "Da Boss" By Glenn Nohara

It seems like 2001 came upon us so quickly. However, before we move on to the new year, I would like to thank our employees, who have worked with focus and a passion to suc-

ceed, in making 2000 a prosperous year for our company. For some, this included working away from home for months at a time. For all, this meant a feeling of ownership in this company, and expecting no less from our fellow workers than we expect from ourselves.

Though we enter 2001 at a hectic pace and with a healthy backlog, we need to obtain work that will meet our planned targets for later this year. However, we want to balance this objective with the types of projects and with the customers we have been profitable with. The Chief, Jits Kunioka, and our Estimating Department are marching towards this end.

Speaking of backlog, for the past several months, I had the opportunity to be part of a work group formed by the State Senate Ways and Means (WAM) and Education and Technology (EDU) Committees to look at long-term solutions for our schools' repair and maintenance (R&M) backlog. The group is lead by Senators Carol Fukunaga and Norman Sakamoto and includes representatives from the Department of Accounting and General Services (DAGS), Department of Education (DOE), and the construction industry.

Issues addressed included identifying, quantifying and prioritizing the R&M projects. Funding sources and amounts were discussed along with project delivery systems that would meet the end users requirements and desires. Contractors were invited to join DAGS and DOE teams as they visited the schools. I was able to visit eight schools and can attest that the backlog is real and needs to be addressed ASAP. Repairs are needed for leaking roofs, falling ceilings, pealing paint (including lead based), termite infestation, structural damage, and electrical and mechanical upgrading to name a few.

It seems like this problem can use Dr. W. Edwards Deming's methods for resolution and optimization. To a great extent, Senators Fukunaga and Sakamoto have done this in calling stakeholders together, having team meetings, brainstorming sessions, diagramming the processes and collecting, quantifying and prioritizing the data. This year's legislature will need to estab-

lish long-term funding and solutions for our schools' R&M backlog.

Well, that is it for now. So until the next Koga Report, continue using the Deming Tools (Team Meetings, Flow Charts, Run Charts, etc.) and work safely.

Congratulations to all the happy parents!



Koga's Kaua'i operations were in high gear to finish out the last quarter of 2000. We completed several projects successfully including the Wilcox Memorial Hospital Employee Parking Lot and two D.O.T. Harbors projects, Revetment Repairs Between Piers 2 & 3 and Fire Hydrant Repair at Pier 3. We are about 70% complete at the Consolidated Pacific Missile Range Projects (Primatech Construction) and also broke ground at the new Kaua'i County Bus Maintenance Facility (Shioi Construction). 
Completed projects this past quarter include
